

GROWING OUR IMPACT

- Both Elementary and Middle School Programs in full operation provided weekly services to 42 unduplicated children and youth with increased participation.
- Moved to provide daily in-home freshly cooked meals to youth programs
- Increase in Food Pantry distribution:
 - 2,274 total people served
 - 49-70 households weekly
 - 85,357 total pounds of food distributed
- Moving towards providing equitable pay and benefits to team members
- Biweekly communication training for team members
- Community engagement is up by 80%
- Increased Community Partnerships


